

## Five key messages


- The Childrens social care system is under considerable pressure in a way that is not perfectly understood
- 2. But focus on the whole system is needed (see right)
- 3. The supply side (providers and workforce) needs more attention
- 4. FDs can engage with Childrens on a medium/long term plan
- 5. Investment will likely be needed to create cost sustainability






#### **Demand: Referrals**

#### Total referrals per 10,000 children (2017/18)




#### Change in referrals (%) (2012/13 – 2017/18)



- In 2017/18, the East of England has 44% less referrals per 10,000 children than West Midlands
- Nationally there has been an increase of 6% since 2012/13
- West Midlands referral rate has increased by 24.6% since 2012/13






#### **Demand: Assessments**

#### Total assessments per 10,000 children (2017/18)




#### Change in assessments (%) (2014/15 - 2017/18)



- In 2017/18, the East of England has 40% less assessments per 10,00 children than North West
- Nationally there has been an increase in assessments of 11.6% since 2014/15
- South East assessment rate has increased by 24.56% since 2014/15

# Children in need vs deprivation




- Positive correlation between child deprivation and the rate of children in need
- Authorities to the right of the trend line have a low rate of children in need for the level of deprivation in their area




### Looked after children

Total looked after children per 10,000 children (2017/18)




Change in looked after children (%) (2014/15 – 2017/18)



- In 2017/18 there was a national average of 64 looked after children per 10,000 children
- The rate of looked after children in the North East is 48% higher than the national average, and has increased by 17% since 2014/15
- In contrast, London's rate of looked after children has decreased by 9% since 2014/15




## Looked after children vs deprivation




- Positive correlation between child deprivation and the rate of looked after children

## Children with statements or EHC plans

Proportion of school children with statements or EHC plans (2017/18)




Change in the proportion of schools children with statements or EHC plans (%) (2014/15 – 2017/18)



- In 2018, nationally 2.9% of school children had statements or EHC plans
- The regions with the greatest proportion of school children with EHC plans or statements in 2018 were the South East (3.09%) and North East (3.07%)
- London has seen the most significant growth in the proportion of school children with EHC plans or statements at 9.56%




# Social worker average caseloads




- In 2017/18, case loads were greatest in the North West at 19.4 cases per social worker
- In contrast, London had average caseloads of 15.8
- The maximum caseload in England is 27 and the minimum is 12

Unit cost children's social care expenditure (2017/18)




#### Change in children's social care expenditure (%) (2014/15 -2017/18)




- In 2017/18, the national average unit cost expenditure was £774 per head
- In 2017/18, unit cost expenditure in the North East was 32% higher than the national average
- The North East has also seen the most significant growth in costs between 2014/15 and 2017/18




Rank out of 9 regions




# **East of England**



Rank out of 9 regions




#### **South East**
